VARICOSE VEINS

"They usually occur in the legs when elastic vein walls and one-way valves weaken," Dr. Kokinos explains. Unlike most vein specialists, Dr. Kokinos is a board-certified vascular surgeon. LEG SWELLING

"After suffering for more than two years with a debilitating swelling in her leg following back surgery, one patient came to us desperate for relief," recalls Dr. Kokinos. The patient's orthopedic surgeon had insisted that the leg swelling was an unfortunate, untreatable effect of the surgery.

Quickly, Dr. Kokinos identified the issue as iliac vein compression, a condition that occurs when the iliac vein is compressed between the spine and right iliac artery. This can cause pain, swelling, and recurrent blood clots in the left leg. "Many physicians

misdiagnose iliac vein compression, attributing the swelling to weight gain or aging," she notes.
